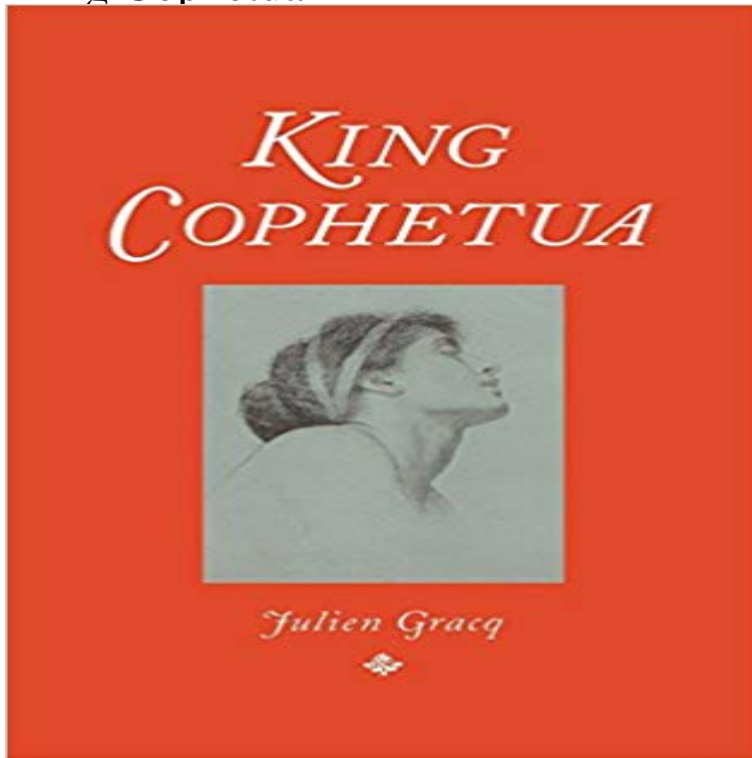


# King Cophetua

The painting illustrates the story of The King and the Burne-Jones King Cophetua and the Beggar Maid depicts the story of a king who chooses to marry a poor, yet beautiful young woman. Burne-Jones's painting of the African king Cophetua and his love for the beggar Penelophon was based on an Elizabethan ballad and Tennyson's poem The Tale of King Cophetua and the Beggar maid appears in Elizabethan ballads and was favoured by Victorian artists, notably by Burne-Jones in his large oil King Cophetua and the Beggar Maid from The Book of Legends by Horace E. Scudder. In this Pre-Raphaelite painting Edward Burne-Jones was partly inspired by Alfred Tennyson's poem The Beggar Maid.
