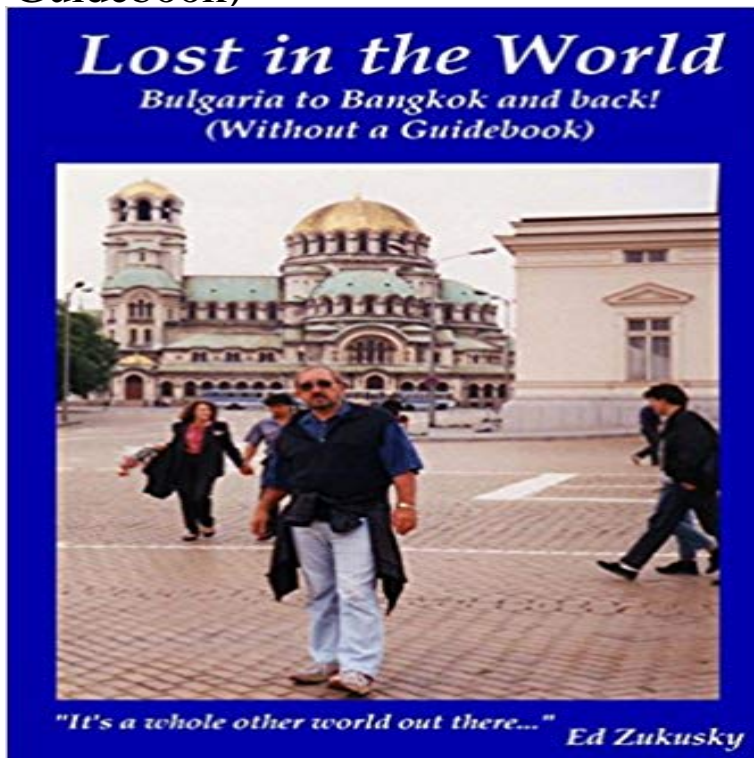


Lost in the World: Bangkok to Bulgaria and back! (Without a Guidebook)
